Transport Day Arrives!

In April of this year, APET took in a sweet, young Terrier mix dog whom we named Addie. We subsequently discovered that Addie was pregnant and it was too late to have her spayed, as the puppies were too developed to safely perform that surgery. At APET we do not normally shelter puppies, because we do not have a proper isolation unit for them. Regardless, puppies were coming, so we had to figure out a way to handle the situation, and fast!

One of our dedicated kennel techs and her family fostered Addie until she gave birth to five beautiful puppies. After that, we dedicated one full room to the momma and her babies. It was shoe coverings, lab coats and gloves for all personnel, and one of our volunteers built a new pen so that Addie and her puppies wouldn't have to share a yard with the other shelter dogs. Let's just say, it was an adventure for all involved!

Luckily, it all went well, and the puppies stayed very happy and healthy throughout. But what to do with five puppies who, by the looks of it, were going to be big dogs? To the rescue came *Pets Going Places* (PGP) out of Colleyville, and their lovely director, Vanessa Vandiver. They are a rescue that assists with pulling dogs from southern shelters and transports them north. Because of mandatory spay and neuter laws, northern shelters have space and need adoptable dogs. Our puppies, and momma Addie, were picked up by PGP and transferred to foster homes in Colorado where they now await adoption. This was APET's first ever animal transport and it was an exciting event for us. We hope to collaborate with PGP in the future, to help stray and abandoned dogs of Wood County find loving homes in northern climates.

As for the puppies, all of us as APET adored them, but are so glad to know they will be placed into loving homes and won't have to wait in a shelter to be adopted! Happy tails, little ones!

Summer Tips for our Furry Friends

It's HOT!! And if you are hot, it's a pretty good bet your pets are hot as well. Here are some tips to help keep them cool.

1. Give plenty of fresh water, throughout the day. Water warms up as it sits, so refill their water bowls often with cool, fresh water.
2. Provide a kiddie pool filled with fresh, cool water, or a sprinkler for them to play in.
3. Never, EVER leave your pet in a parked car. Temps in a parked car with the windows cracked on an 85 degree day, can reach 102 degrees in 10 minutes. After 30 minutes, the temperature can reach 120. Your pet can suffer irreversible organ damage, or death.
4. Watch the humidity. If the humidity is too high, animals are unable to cool themselves and their internal temperature will skyrocket. Taking a dog's temperature will tell you quickly if there is a problem. It should not be over 104 degrees. If it is, follow the instructions for treating a pet for heat stroke.
5. Don't rely on a fan. Dogs don't cool the same way we do, so a fan does little good.
6. Make sure they have plenty of access to shade, throughout the day.
7. Limit the time their feet are on hot sand or pavement.
8. Prepare for power outages. Have an emergency plan for your pet in case of power outage, just like you would for your family.
